

Dear Friends,

Candlemas (2 February) is a time when we look back at the events of Christmas and Epiphany. For many, Candlemas marks the end of the season of Christmas. December 25th seems a long time ago; the decorations were packed away weeks ago, the last of the cake has been eaten and the presents used or put away.

The story we are celebrating is found in Luke 2: 22-40, where Mary and Joseph bring the infant Jesus to the Temple in Jerusalem 40 days after his birth to dedicate him to God, according to religious laws and traditions of the day.

As they brought Jesus to the Temple, they met Simeon, who had been promised "He should not see death before he had seen the Messiah of the Lord" (Luke 2:26). In his prophecy, Simeon said the child would be a light for revelation to the nations. Simeon foretold times of darkness when he talked about the "Rise and fall of many". Luke 2:34.

Our world is indeed a dark place at times – we only need to read the newspaper or watch the News programmes on TV to read about war, famine, abuse, murder and the "inner thoughts of many" (Luke 2:35) have been revealed. But - Candlemas is also a time when we look forward.

At the beginning of February we begin to come out of a dark winter and look towards the brighter spring and longer periods of daylight. The earliest civilisations would have been aware of this and in pre-Christian times there would have been ceremonies to encourage the sun to increase in power and bring back the sunlight that they craved. These rituals would almost certainly have included the lighting fires and tapers of light.

Although we know that sunlight is necessary for growth, we also know that we do not need to light fires in order for Spring and Summer to come round again.

The blessing of candles at Candlemas dates back to the 11th Century, and to a time when candles and oil lamps were the only source of light available during the dark hours. From the start Christians used candles for the practical purpose of providing light in places like the Catacombs, where they met in secret to pray and celebrate the Eucharist. Soon candles came to represent the Light of Christ, and were used at baptism and confirmation to symbolise the Christian turning from the darkness of sin to the redeeming Light of Jesus.

As we remember that Jesus is the light of the world, we should also remember that He said, "You are the **light of the world" (Matthew 5:14)**

We are the light of the world, not the light of the church. That means we must get beyond the church walls and take the light out to where it is dark. In our dark world, we can shine out as lights by showing kindness and compassion to others and yourself, by looking for opportunities to be more like Jesus, to lift others up, and to do the right thing.

As we look forward to Lent – Ash Wednesday is on 14 February - let's consider how we can be lights in the world and shine brightly in this dark world.


TO A SNOWDROP

Everyone at Rodmarton School had lots of fun in the run up to Christmas – the nativity performance, carol concert, wreath making workshops (for both parents and pupils), panto trip, and lots more – but we have to give a big shout out to The Friends of Rodmarton School which raised an astonishing £2,285 with its 16 Days of Christmas advent raffle.



Huge thanks too to everyone who donated prizes which meant that we had a prize, sometime two, for each weekday during the school term in December. It was brilliantly organised by The Friends and, aside from it being loads of fun for the parents and school community, the children will benefit from the amazing amount raised. This term the children are continuing with their Rocksteady Music School rock and pop band lessons. Children in all three classes are really enjoying learning and performing the many different instruments and, later this term, we are looking forward to hearing them play in a special concert.

Pupils also continue to enjoy taking part in the Daily Mile, a global initiative to improve children's physical, social, emotional and mental health and wellbeing by encouraging them to be active for 15 minutes a day. NOTES FROM CULKERTON

GARDENING TIPS FOR FEBRUARY

Welcome to 2024, already with the mild wet winter early spring flowers are cheerfully making their annual returns. Snowdrops, crocus, miniature iris, primroses and hellebores at ground level. Fragrant shrubs, my favourites, Daphne 'Jacqueline Postill', winter honeysuckle, Lonicera 'Winter Beauty', Sweet Box 'Sarcococca confusa' and Cornus officinallis. This winter, vibrant orange berries of wild Iris foetidissima have persisted longer to form an eye-catching contrast to the gentle spring palette, with the exception of the soon to appear sunny yellow daffodils.

This month is the celebration of snowdrops and we are very fortunate to live in an area much favoured for these little bulbs. We are able to visit open gardens to see masses growing on large areas or collections of species and named varieties.

Winter flowers are very resilient; they are adapted to grow and wait cycles of mild or cold snaps. Periods of cold weather are very important to our deciduous trees and plants who need a rest. As gardeners of course we can take advantage of this for pruning when the sap is down in the roots for most fruit trees (not plums or cherries which need summer pruning only to avoid diseases). Mature apple trees in particular need attention now. Looking at their winter frame, first remove any dead wood making clean cuts with clean, sharp tools. Look for crossing or inward growing branches removing these to form an open shape to allow good air movement and sunlight. Cut no more than a third of the total mass, probably a lot less if trees are pruned regularly.

Prunings can shredded and used as mulches or composted. The addition of coffee grounds to compost heaps is useful as they add nitrogen. Mix in with annual weeds and dry leaves.

This winter our old apple tree has a magnificent, beautiful layer of moss on the main trunks. This does not pose any disadvantage to the tree and will disappear when dry, hot weather makes a return later in the year. However, the moss is a great bonus for all our garden nesting birds; it has a gold standard for nest building.

Another welcome for this new year was seeing the newly emerging shoots of Broad Beans sown in open ground during early December. Now is the time to plant more beans for a succession; use some judgement for weather conditions as a warmer, dry, frost free day is best. These hardy beans can be sown into March.

NOTES FROM CULKERTON (cont)

Other seeds to sow now depends on sheltered greenhouse or inside propagation. If this is limited just wait for warmer weather in later months. Some plants do need a longer growing season and do well as windowsill plants until frosty or cold nights have ceased. Some of you may have the luxury of heated greenhouses or grow lights and you will be far in advance of the rest of us! So, let's consider tender veg plants to start now, peppers are the seeds to sow. Hot, eye watering incendiary peppers or large bell peppers need the same cultivation. Start in heat, choose a good seed compost or sieve your own home made, add sand, fine horticultural grit or vermiculite to have it all free draining. Keep the seedlings growing on in warm environment, shielded from cold draughts.

I prefer to wait before sowing tomato seeds until March or April as depending on the weather outside, we could get a cold or warm spring. The cultivation is the same as peppers, and if we have hot summer weather both do well planted outside.

MIDWINTER BLUES – ASSISTED BY WINNIE THE POOH

This winter is tracking its predecessor. That may or may not be worrying, given that 2023 was a damp squib that partially redeemed itself by serving up a best-ever June.

Again, a precipitously wet autumn (426mm fell in Culkerton during 2023's three autumn months) gave way to a cold snap at the start of December (with hoar frost twinkling on the trees, as Winnie The Pooh famously puts it in *Lines Written by a Bear of Very Little* Brain). December sogged and bogged its way to dumping 182mm on worldweary Culkerton, and January '24 started Wet, Wet, Wet.

Then, for the second year running, just as the floodings threatened to become biblical, someone switched the tap off, wisely and mercifully. Last year, this happened on January 15th, after 134mm had fallen in just fourteen days. This year, the tap got turned off ten days earlier, after 52mm. On both occasions, this happened just in time to save London from flooding.

A lengthy cold but dry spell began. Streams of rooks and 'daws flew off each rosy dawn to go work in the fields, and all seemed right with the world. Back in 2023, the dry spell lasted until March 7th, when our jet stream jumped south, ushering in an old-fashioned wet spring. We will see what happens this year...

and everything else. In the western part of the village, nearly all the drains were put in in the wrong place, back in the 1960s apparently: all bar one catches only the water that falls directly into it, as rainfall or vehicle splash. The resultant stream of surface water criss-crosses the road several times, having bypassed the long blocked-up drain by the little green chapel, before disappearing down the single effective drain – if that drain blocks up, through leaf accumulation, mud or worse, the lane will flood. Some brave soul keeps it clear. Me. The road surface is steadily breaking up.

One ends up feeling like poor Pooh:

On Tuesday, when it hails and snows, The feeling on me grows and grows That hardly anybody knows If those are these or these are those.

Poor Pooh's existential confusion terminates:

On Thursday, when it starts to freeze
And hoar-frost twinkles on the trees,
How very readily one sees
That these are whose--but whose are these?
